Burned Children Receive Reconstructive Surgery

Several children from across the Middle East were brought to the U.S. for reconstructive plastic surgery in 1999. In March, one-year-old **Amal Khatib** (at right) from Jenin arrived with her mother for reconstructive surgery by Dr. Jeffrey DeWeese at St. Francis Hospital in San Francisco. Also in March, **Mohammed Abu Nassar** from Jebalya refugee camp had plastic surgery on his burned face by Dr. Michael Peters at Mercy Hospital in San Diego, CA. In April, **Looia Ahmed**, 11, an Egyptian boy living in Dubai, had plastic surgery at the Shriners Hospital for Burned Children in Cincinnati, Ohio. In October, **Magdalene Sadi**, 14, from Jenin had plastic surgery on her abdomen. She was burned by Israeli soldiers during the Intifada and was treated by Dr. Kevin Hopkins of Medical City Hospital in Dallas.

The team performed one week of extensive surgery on many sick Arab children.

Italian Cardiac Team Saves Lives in Jerusalem

In early July, an 8-member team of pediatric cardiac surgeons began treating sick Arab children with congenital heart disease at Makassed Islamic Charitable Hospital on the Mount of Olives in East Jerusalem. Led by Dr. Giancarlo Crupi, (below with two patients) a cardiac surgeon from Bergamo, Italy, the team worked for a week on many sick and dying Arab babies, saving the lives of many children who otherwise would not get the care they needed.

Also included on the team were Dr. Adele Borghi, a pediatric cardiologist, Silvana Crisci, the perfusionist, Dr. Claudio Pansera, an anesthesitist, two ICU nurses, Sofia Avogadri and Giovanna Bagini, Cinzia Capelli, a scrub nurse and Bresciani Orietta, a theater assistant. The PCRF plans to send Dr. Crupi and his team back to the Middle East again in the year 2000 to continue to provide sick children livesaving surgery, as well as train for local doctors and nurses in pediatric cardiac surgery

Belgians are First Pediatric Cardiac Team to Work in

Ramallah Hospital -

The third team of pediatric cardiac surgeons to operate in Palestine through the PCRF in 1999 arrived in Ramallah Hospital at the end of July to begin open-heart surgery on sick children with congenital heart disease. Led by Professor Guido Van Nooten, head of cardiac surgery at

the University of Gent, the 10-member team included pediatric cardiologists, Dr. Daniel de Wolf and Dr. Bert Suys, another cardiac surgeon named Dr. Katrien Francois, Dr. Luc Foubert and Dr. Koen Reyntijens, intensivists/anesthesiologists, Gigi Coppieters and Katrien Van Hooren, the ICU nurses, Filip De Somer, the perfusionist and Mieke Olieslagers, the scrub nurse. The team operated for a week on sick Arab children from all over the West Bank and Gaza Strip, including the first children ever treated in the new catherization lab at Ramallah Hospital, which was built by the Belgian government and opened in June.

Second Belgian Mission in Results in Training Program

In October, the same team of pediatric cardiac surgeons, plus another anesthesiologist, again worked for a week at Ramallah Hospital. In addition to providing lifesaving surgery to dozens of sick babies, the mission also resulted in a decision by the Belgian Government to fund a long-term training program headed by Professor Van Nooten, who the PCRF first sent to Palestine in January.

Adult Cardiae Team Saves lives in Ramallah

In November, the PCRF sent a 10-member team of adult cardiac surgeons from St. Francis Hospital in Tulsa, Oklahoma to Ramallah Hospital to provide life-saving open-heart surgery and other invasive procedures for sick adult patients from throughout the West Bank. Led by surgeon Dr. Charles Berry and cardiologist Dr. Tom Wisenbaugh, the team performed over two-dozen cardiac procedures in the operating room and catherization lab. Other members of the team included ICU nurses Debi Lammert, Marilyn Bradley, Kathy Gordon and Patti Averill. In the theater were perfusionist Jim Reagor, as well as Matt Jezik, CST, and

nurses Glenda Bullock and Debby Pry. The group brought tens of thousands of dollars worth of medical supplies and equipment and worked for two weeks. They were the first adult team of cardiac surgeons working in the West Bank. The PCRF plans to continue to upgrade both adult and cardiac surgery in the Middle East by sending more teams of surgeons and cardiologists to the region to provide life-saving treatment, as well as training for local personnel

Plastic Surgeon Returns to Gaza for Second time to provide free surgery



In early July, the PCRF sent Dr. Michael Peters, a plastic surgeon in San Diego, to Shifa Hospital in the Gaza Strip,

where he provided free surgery for 17 burned and injured people. This is the second time that Dr. Peters has volunteered to work in Palestine through the PCRF. He also has treated several injured Arab children for free at Mercy Hosptial in San Diego. In addition to providing many suffering patients much needed plastic and reconstructive surgery, Dr. Peters also donated important medical supplies and equipment to Shifa Hospital, including a dermatone machine for taking skin-grafts, and tissue expanders for burn patients

Plastic Surgery Team Treats Patients in Nablus

In August, the PCRF sent a six-member team of plastic surgeons and nurses from The Small World Foundation to Rafidiah Hospital in Nablus to provide free plastic and reconstructive surgery for patients with burn injuries, as well as congenital deformities and other disfiguring problems that could not be treated locally. Working over a week period, the team provided highly specialized surgical care to dozens of poor and needy patients from all over the West Bank. Team members included Dr. Kevin Hopkins, Dr. Jeff Arliss, Dr. Paul



Berig, and three nurses, Suzanne Walls, Sheilagh Brosky and Gayle Schotte. The PCRF will continue to work with Small World Foundation to send more teams of plastic surgeons to the Middle East in the year 2000.

PCRF Ships Wheelchairs, Rehabilitation Team to Gaza

In July, the PCRF sent a 12-member team of rehabilitation specialists from Hope Haven Ministries to Gaza to fit handicapped patients with wheelchairs that were shipped from the US in a 40-foot container. The wheelchairs were donated to the Palestinian Union of Sport for Handicapped, who then distributed them to over 150 poor handicapped patients. There are hundreds of needy handicapped patients in the refugee

camps and towns of Gaza who do not have wheelchairs. This shipment provided hundreds of families a new chance at mobility and a better life. The PCRF plans to work again with Hope Haven to provide other medical shipments to needy patients in the Middle East in the next year.



Other Medical Supplies and Equipment Shipped to Palestine

The PCRF continued to help institutions and doctors in Palestine provide better care to poor patients by providing them medical supplies and equipment donated from the US. In July, 12 infusion pumps were sent to Makassed and Ramallah Hospitals to upgrade their ICU units. A month later, a shipment of disposable surgical supplies were donated by the PCRF to Rafidiah Hospital in Nablus. In October, ophthalmic surgical supplies were sent to the Eye Hospital in Gaza City. This is the second shipment of ophthalmic supplies sent to the Eye Hospital in the past year.

Medical Projects for the year

Treating Injured Youths in North America:

The PCRF will continue to bring injured and sick Arab children from all over the Middle East for free medical care in the U.S. These are children who cannot be adequately treated in their homeland. We have already arranged free care for several youths and are in need of plane tickets to cover their travel expenses. We also need funds to cover the other basic expenses that the children have while in-country, such as telephone calls to their families, clothing and food.



"Healing Hearts" Campaign:

The PCRF will continue save the lives of sick children and train local doctors by sending at least eight more teams of pediatric cardiac surgeons to the region in 2000. We will continue to work with the teams that we sent there last year from Europe, namely the Belgian team from the University of Gent, as well as the Italian team from Bergamo. Each team will go three times in 2000, with the government of Belgium assisting in covering the plane tickets of the Belgian team. We will also send a pediatric cardiac team from Switzerland, led by Dr. Antonio Corno, and an American team called "Project Open Hearts" from Colorado to do adult cardiac patients.

Other Surgical Teams:

The PCRF has several other surgical teams lined up to go to Palestine and Lebanon in 2000 to provide specialized surgery for injured and sick youths, as well as training for local physicians and nurses. We will continue to work with "Small World Foundation" to send two teams of plastic surgeons to the Middle East. One team will go to Lebanon to provide plastic surgery for burned and disfigured patients in the refugee camps, while the other team will continue to work in the West Bank, as they did in 1999. We are also planning on sending a team of ophthalmic surgeons from "Sight to the Blind" foundation. We sent this team to Gaza in 1998 and will send them to Lebanon in 2000 to provide ophthalmic surgery on refugees in the camps..

Medical Shipments:

The PCRF will continue to provide health institutions and local organizations donated medical equipment and supplies in the following year, based on our ability to locate these items. One particular shipment will entail a 40-foot container of cardiac surgery supplies donated by "Project Open Heart" to be sent to Ramallah Hospital for our visiting teams to use.
