



# to the Palestine Children's Relief Fund

The PCRF is a nonpolitical, nonprofit humanitarian relief group that has been arranging free medical care for Arab children who cannot be treated locally. Over the past several years, we have expanded to include sending volunteer teams of doctors and nurses to the region to provide expert free medical care and training for local medical personnel. In addition to sending children outside for treatment and sending teams to the Middle East to treat patients and train locals, we also have been sending medical equipment and supplies to the region. In 2001, we started to support other projects, such as a summer camp for handicapped children and a women's empowerment program for single mothers with large families.

The PCRF depends on the support and help of local volunteers in countries where we are sending children for treatment. In the US, Italy, Belgium, Saudi Arabia and Jordan, people host families of sick or injured children, taking them to their appointments and translating for doctors in the hospitals. Countless volunteers have opened their homes to host children, pick them up from the airport or donate money and clothing to ensure that they are well taken care of during their travel for medical care outside

of their homeland. The PCRF would like to thank and acknowledge the support of these volunteers in making our work possible.

A special thanks also goes out to the many doctors and nurses who have helped treat our children for free. Many of the top surgeons have given their time and skills to save the lives of children sent to them from the PCRF. We also thank the many people who have gone to the Middle East on humanitarian missions to treat our children on the ground there. Their courage and determination to provide a humanitarian service during a time of terrible violence in the Holy Land was an inspiration to everyone.

Finally, to the donors who have given us the support to do our work, we say thank you. Enclosed you will find a report on our work over the past year, and our projects and budget for 2002. We hope that you will continue to support our efforts and enable us to provide the humanitarian medical relief that is needed to relieve some of the suffering in the Middle East during these dark days.

# from the Chairman

#### **Dear Supporter,**

With the eyes of the world focused on the war against terrorism, Palestine is slowly burning to ashes under the flames of military occupation.

Since September of 2000, hundreds of unarmed innocent children in the West Bank and Gaza Strip have been killed by Israeli soldiers and settlers, with thousand more injured. Tanks prevent children from going to school; Apache helicopters wake them from their sleep and roadblocks and checkpoints prevent them from moving around freely.

In the midst of oppression, the Palestine Children's Relief Fund (PCRF) is there helping the injured by providing urgent medical care, shipping badly needed medical supplies and medication, sending volunteer teams of highly specialized doctors and nurses to treat complex cases, and continuing our mission in arranging free medical care in the US and Europe for children who cannot be treated locally.

This 2001 annual report provides a comprehensive summary of our mission, activities, lifesaving efforts and budgetary needs.

Since our mission is to help provide free of charge lifesaving medical care, not available in Palestine or the Arab World, to injured and needy Palestinian and other Arab children, imagine the new and overwhelming responsibility that has been thrust upon us during these extremely difficult times.

Since its establishment in 1991, the PCRF has expanded its activities, to the extent that our resources permitted, to meet the rising and expanding need of a population under a brutal occupation.

#### We now have four main lifesaving programs. These are:

- Provide free medical care in the United States and Europe to injured and seriously ill Palestinian (and other Arab) children whose medical needs require advanced care not available in their homelands;
- 2. Send volunteer medical missions to the Middle East from the United States and Europe to treat, on location and often in the middle of battles, a large number of injured and sick children, and when possible destitute adults. This also provides important training and technical support for local doctors and nurses as well;
- 3. Donate urgently needed medical equipment and supplies;
- 4. Provide other humanitarian projects to improve the quality of life for poor and needy children.

The Board of Trustees and medical advisory board of the Palestine Children's Relief Fund are a group of volunteers highly dedicated to helping Palestinian and Arab children in need. They are mothers, doctors, businessmen and professionals. They are American, Arab-American, European, and Arab.

A majority of our staff live in the Middle East. They endure and suffer very much like the people they serve. They dodge bullets, argue with military officials and bureaucrats to ensure that those children who need our help, receive it. We owe them a tremendous debt of gratitude for risking their lives helping those in desperate need of lifesaving assistance.

Our work could have never succeeded without the generosity and the support of thousands of caring and generous people like you.

Sadly, I am asking you to help us save the lives of suffering more injured, maimed and permanently scarred children who, without your generosity and financial support, we would be unable to help.

My colleagues on the board of trustees, the members of our distinguished international medical advisory board, our hundreds of volunteers and our staff living in the war zone, are all honored and humbled by the

responsibilities that we have voluntarily agreed to shoulder. In one voice gripped with concern for the thousands of the injured and the needy in

Palestine and other parts of the Arab World, we ask you to please donate generously.


These are troubling and painful times. With your generous financial donation and our expertise, we will rise to the challenge and help save the lives of

# PROGRAMS

#### **Children Treated Abroad in 2001**

The **PCRF** was set up ten years ago as a nonpolitical, nonprofit humanitarian organization to help arrange free medical care abroad for injured and sick Palestinian children during the first uprising. Since then, we have provided hundreds of children free medical care not available to them, for financial or economic reasons, in the Middle East. As we have expanded our humanitarian efforts to help Arab children in other areas of the region, we have found care not only in North America, but also in Europe and other parts of the Middle East. The following list of children were treated by the PCRF in 2001. We hope to be able to provide more sick and injured Arab children the medical care they need in 2002.




#### **Children Treated in the Middle East**



# Missions in 2001

## Healing Hearts Campaign, 2001.

Heart disease in the Middle East is a major problem. In Palestine, Syria and Iraq, there are no working pediatric cardiac surgery programs. For the thousands of Arab children born each year with congenital heart disease there, most of them die without treatment. In 1998, the PCRF began a "Healing Hearts" Campaign to address this humanitarian crisis. We are the only nonprofit relief group working with the local ministries of health in each country to build a long-term solution to this deadly problem. In 2001, we sent missions to each country, and continued to send dozens of children outside for lifesaving surgery. The PCRF will continue to try to build a working adult and pediatric cardiac surgery program in the Middle East in 2002. This includes our effort to continue to send missions there to treat dying patients, sending children abroad for surgery, and working to train local doctors and nurses in cardiac surgery. We also have set up a committee of specialists in cardiac surgery to deal with this problem directly. Below are some of the projects the PCRF initiated and supported in 2002.

#### **Italian Pediatric Cardiac Surgeon Visits Damascus**

In January, the PCRF sent Dr. Giancarlo Crupi, a pediatric cardiac surgeon from Bergamo, Italy, to Damascus to evaluate the needs of the local pediatric cardiac surgery hospitals there. The PCRF will be sending an Italian team of cardiac surgeons, doctors and nurses in 2002 to do life-saving open-heart surgery on sick Arab children. This mission this mission will save the lives of sick babies with heart disease, as well as train local doctors.

# Pediatric Cardiologist from Oakland Children's Hospital Treats Sick Babies in Ramallah.



In addition to providing children lifesaving surgery for sick children with heart disease, he also provided important screening, that resulted in many operations for sick and injured youths. # **Professor of Pediatric Cardiac Surgery Tours Gaza and West Bank:**

Also in early June, Professor Guido Van Nooten, the head of cardiac surgery at the University of Gent in Belgium, again visited Palestine as an official member of his government to see about setting up the first and only catherization lab in the Gaza Strip. He also was there to advise on a new Intensive Care Unit for Ramallah Hospital. Professor Van Nooten first went to Palestine through the PCRF in February 1999. He then led four surgery missions to the West Bank, and has also visited the refugee camps in Lebanon, Jordan and Iraq on behalf of the PCRF. He also is taking Arab children for surgery at his hospital in Belgium.

#### **Pediatric Cardiac Mission to Baghdad**

In February, the PCRF sent Professor Guido Van Nooten, chief of cardiac surgery at the University of Gent in Belgium, and Professor Ra-id Abdulla, a pediatric cardiologist from Rush Hospital in Chicago, to Iraq to evaluate the possibility of setting up a pediatric cardiac surgery program for sick and dying Arab babies there with congenital heart disease. Each year, thousand of Arab children die in Iraq as a result of not getting adequate surgery for congenital heart disease. The mission also evaluated Arab babies in need of cardiac surgery, and is working on sending these children for life-saving surgery abroad. As a result of this mission, five Iraqi babies were sent to Belgium, as several others to Abu Dhabi for lifesaving surgery.

#### **Cardiac Surgery Mission to Lebanon**

In February, the PCRF sent Dr. Imad Tabry, an adult cardiac surgeon from Florida, to refugee camps in Lebanon to evaluate the possibility of setting up a cardiac surgery program for the Palestinian population in Lebanon. There is, currently, no cardiac surgery program in Lebanon for the refugees. Over a three day period, Dr. Tabry visited Al-Hamshiry Hospital in Ein El-Hilwah Refugee Camp, Haifa Hospital in the Bourj Al-Barajnah Refugee Camp, and met with UNRWA and PRCS officials to discuss setting up such a program there.

#### **American Cardiologist to Ramallah Hospital:**

In late Februrary, the PCRF sent Dr. Tom Wisenbaugh, an adult cardiologist from St. Francis Hospital in Tulsa, OK to Ramallah Hospital to work with the local team in the new catherization lab. Bringing thousands of dollars worth of donated medical supplies, Dr. Wisenbaugh provided good working experience in providing life-sving invasive cardiac procedures with Palestinain doctors and nurses.

"It is during difficult times like these that we find out who our real friends are," Dr. Riyad Zannoun, the Palestinian Minister of Health, told the team during a meeting in his office in April. "We are truly grateful for your courage and dedication to helping our people and hope that you will continue to work with us in building a good cardiac program in Gaza."

The six-member cardiac team is from the Holy Cross Hospital in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. In addition to Dr. Tabry, who is a well-known cardiac surgeon there, it also included Dr. Jim Calabrese, an anesthesiologist, Nestor Megano, a perfusionist, and Layna Harper, Mari Noel Araya and Teresa Miller, three nurses. The team brought with them thousands of dollars worth of donated surgery supplies for cardiac surgery, as well as preparing a shipment of surgery supplies.






still able to save the lives of many sick and dying patients who otherwise would not have gotten care they needed.


## **† Ophthalmic Missions**

Many poor Arab patients throughout the Middle East lost their eyesight too soon due to the lack of adequate ophthalmic care. The PCRF has been sending ophthalmic missions to Palestine, Lebanon, Syria and Iraq since 1998 and have saved the eyesight of hundreds of patients. Working as volunteers, the teams of ophthalmic specialists bring thousands of dollars worth of donated medical supplies and equipment and help train local doctors and nurses while treating poor and needy patients. In 2001, the PCRF established a working relationship with the ministry of health in Syria to provide long-term training to local ophthalmic surgeons, as well as treatment for patients. We will continue to work also in Palestine and other regional countries in the future to provide help in this important medical field.

#### **Ophthalmic Evaluation Mission to Syria/Iraq**

In January, the PCRF sent its Lebanon coordinator, Ms. Nuha Al- Masry, and the PCRF ophthalmic coordinator, Ms. Baillie Brown, to evaluate the ophthalmology needs of poor people in Syria and Iraq. They went for 10 days and met with many doctors and hospitals to do a good evaluation of the surgical needs there. As a result of that visit, the PCRF sent an eye surgery team to Syria later in the Spring to provide sight-saving eye surgery for poor people, as well as training for local Arab doctors.

#### Ophthalmic Surgery team treats patients in the remote area of Syria



During the first week of May, a six-member team of volunteer eye surgeons and nurses were sent by the PCRF at Al-Hasakah Hospital in northern Syria, where medical care is very poor. Led by surgeons Dr. Francis Nathan from Australia and Dr. Gregory Hay from Canada, and coordinated by Baillie Brown, the team saved the sight of dozens of patients who otherwise would have get the surgery they needed (see list of patients below). Working closely with the local staff at Al-Hasakah Hospital, the team often worked for 12 hours a day to ensure that many patients got the treatment they needed.

In early October, the PCRF sent a mission led by Ophtalmic coordinator Baillie Brown and Lebanon/Syria Coordinator Nuha Al-Masry on their second working mission to Hasakeh Hospital in Syria in 2001. Bringing thousands of dollars worth of donated surgery supplies and working with local surgeons trained in the May mission, they were able to get over a dozen poor patients sight-saving surgery that was otherwise not available to them there (see list).

## Plastic Surgery Missions

# American Plastic Surgery Team Treats injured and Burned Children in Nablus

Like other specializations listed in this report, the need for plastic and reconstructive surgeons in the Middle East is important. In Palestine, there are too few specialists helping provide burned and injured children the type of specialized reconstructive and plastic surgery that they need for long-term recovery. Since 1997, the PCRF has been sending such specialists to Palestine and Lebanon to work as volunteers on children in need. In May, an 8-member team of plastic and reconstructive doctors and nurses were sent by the PCRF from the US to Rafidiah Hospital in Nablus to treat burned, injured and other Arab children who could not be treated locally (see list of cases treated below). Working days after Israeli F-16s bombed Nablus and killed a dozen people, the team courageously did not postpone their trip and provided not only

great medical services, but also a boost to the moral of the people there. Led by surgeons Dr. Kevin Hopkins and Dr. Michael Peters, who have both been to Palestine in the past through the PCRF, the team also donated tens of thousands of dollars worth of medical supplies to the hospital and provided much needed training as well. The team was hosted by the Ministry of Health and were made up of members from "Small World Foundation."

# ☐ PCRF Sends Pediatric Orthopedic Surgeon West Bank, Gaza and Lebanon

Pediatric Orthopedic Surgery is a major problem in the Middle E In Palestine, there is a great need to provide such a special service, especially with the high number of children injured by gunfire and shells. In 2001, the PCRF responded to this crisi sending a well-known pediatric orthopedic surgeon from the U the West Bank, Gaza and Lebanon to do an evaluation of orthopedic needs there, as well as to provide some treatmer children in the refugee camps in Lebanon. The last week of June Hugh Watts, a pediatric orthopedic surgeon from Los Angeles the former chief of staff at the Shriners Hospital there, toured hosp in Palestine and Lebanon. There he saw many sick and injured children in need of surgery. He also evaluated the needs in pedi orthopedic surgery in the region. In Lebanon, Dr. Watts particip in orthopedic surgery procedures and provided an evaluation re to the PCRF on the long-term needs for improving the qualit pediatric orthopedic card in the region. We hope to send him working mission there in 2002.

# RELIEF PROJECTS IN 2001

In 2001, the PCRF responded to the great humanitarian crisis in Palestine by sponsoring several projects designed to provide poor and needy people relief. These included a summer camp in Hebron, a Trauma Training course, Wheelchair Shipments to Gaza and Syria, and an empowerment program for poor women with large families.

## ☐ The Sponsorship of Six Summer Camps for Handicapped Children in the Hebron District:



In early August, the PCRF sponsored summer camps run by "Community" Based Rehabilitation" (CBR) in the Hebron districts of Yatta, Samou, Daheriah, Beit Awa and Dura East and West. Over 500 handicapped and able-bodied Arab children participated in these camps. The main activities of these camps were: the implementation of several activities by local medical organizations concerning health education, including health tests, for children. It also included some physiotherapy information and lectures on many topics, such as oral hygiene. Agricultural activities concerning the planting and care of trees, while stressing to the children the importance of agriculture in society, were also part of the camps. In addition, there were many cultural and art activities that included theater, drawing, story telling, and art workshops. Physical and sports activities, as well as traditional plays, were also part of the summer camps. According to a report by CBR, the "existence of the CBR program in the community allocated in the most remote areas and dealing with the most oppressed people, has given the chance to support our children in this difficult situation and draw a smile on their faces."

#### Team of Trauma Specialists Train Mental Health Professionals in West Bank

#### and Gaza

In late August and early September, a six American and one Dutch mental health professionals held two separate five-day seminars in Ramallah for Bir Zeit University School of Public Health, and the Gaza Mental Health Clinic. The team provided training for dozens of Palestinian mental health professionals from many governmental and non-governmental organizations and institutions in the areas of Critical Incident Stress

Debriefing (CISD) and Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR). While there are over three million Palestinians living under harsh political and economic conditions in the West Bank and Gaza Strip, there are only 12 psychiatrists and less than 50 mental health workers (psychologists, therapists and clinical social workers). The purpose of this mission was to help address the issue of children suffering from is Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). Due to the extremely violent conditions that children are living under there, this project was needed and will be supported again in 2002.





#### Women Empowerment Program

## Providing Poor Families Economic Independence



In 2001, the PCRF launched for the first time a project to provide start-up economic grants to poor mothers of large families in the West Bank and Gaza Strip. Since the Al-Aqsa Intifada erupted, the standard of living and income for large poor families in Palestine has dropped significantly. No one is hit harder by the Israeli siege and war on the Palestinian people than single-mother families with small children. The PCRF has responded to this crisis by providing grants to women to enable them to begin small businesses or economic efforts that can help provide them continued income so the enable them to feed and better take care of their children.

The following women were sponsored in 2001. We hope to continue this project in 2002 by identifying interviewing, and supporting many more women in Palestine seeking a chance to support and take care of their children by working for themselves.



## EMT Specialist Trains PRCS Ambulance Drivers in Ramallah

In June, the PCRF sent Shane Debrowski, an Emergency Medical Technician from Canada to the Palestine

Red Crescent Society (PRCS) in Ramallah to help upgrade their emergency medical services. Due to the Israeli siege and closure of much of the West Bank and Gaza Strip, it is more important than ever to provide expert first-aid training for Palestinian ambulance drivers who risk their lives to transport injured and sick patients to hospitals. Many patients have lost their lives due to Israeli closures over the past few months, including many who were in ambluances, but were prevented from crossing an IDF checkpoint to get to a hospital.

In 2001, the PCRF sponsored two containers of donated wheelchairs from the US for handicapped refugees in the Middle East. Both containers were donated by "Hope Haven International" out of Iowa. The first container was a 250 chair shipment that arrived in Gaza in early January. These chairs were given for free by the PCRF, which also sent a small team of technicians from Hope Haven to Gaza to specially fit each handicapped child with their special chair. There are hundreds of poor people in Gaza who do not have access to such items. In October, the PCRF shipped a 20-foot container of chairs to UNRWA in Syria. They were distributed to poor refugees in Syria who otherwise do not have access to good quality wheelchairs. The PCRF has sent many shipments of wheelchairs in the past to Palestine, Lebanon and now Syria and we hope to be able to provide poor handicapped children and others free chairs again in the future.





# Medical Relief Projects for 2002

In 2002, the PCRF will respond to the great humanitarian crisis in the Middle East by continuing to provide medical relief for poor and needy Arab children. This will entail continuing our efforts in the following areas:



- 1. Arranging Medical Care fof Sick and Injured Youths: The PCRF was set up 10 years ago to arrange free medical are for sick and injured Palestinian youths during the first Intifada. Since then, we have sent nearly 200 children outside for free medical care that was not available to them locally. In response to the Al-Aqsa Intifada, 2001 was our most active year, as we sent several dozen children to the US, Europe and other parts of the Middle East for expert medical care not available to them locally. In 2002, we plan to continue to send children outside for free medical care, as well as to cover the medical costs of children locally in the Middle East, whenever possible.
- 2. Medical Missions to the Middle East: In 2001, the PCRF sponsored many missions to the region to help treat sick and injured patients locally, as well as to train local doctors and nurses. In 2002, we plan to continue to initiate and organize such missions. These will include more pediatric and adult cardiac surgery teams to provide life-saving surgery locally in the region as part of our "Healing Hearts" Campaign. We also plan to send specialists in ophthalmic, orthopedic, urological and plastic surgery-all areas where there is a great need for such help.
- 3. Humanitarian Projects: The PCRF is dedicated to supporting projects that help improve the welfare of children in the Middle East. In 2001, we sponsored a summer camp in Hebron, a mental health training team, wheelchair shipments and a women empowerment program that is designed to enable poor women a grant to enable them to provide relief for their families. These projects are important for the daily well-being of poor and needy children in the Middle East, which is why the PCRF will continue to support such humanitarian projects in
